Forest Fire Activity Near Springpole

This past June, forest fires were rampant in northwestern Ontario due to dry conditions and electrical storms. At the peak of the season in mid-July there were more than 130 active fires burning in the region. In early July, an active forest fire within one kilometre of the Springpole camp caused us to suspend operations and evacuate all employees and contractors. Fire crews from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) stayed at our camp to suppress the fire and protect the area.

On August 5, 2021, the MNRF reported that the forest fire was classified as "under control." First Mining Gold would like to express our gratitude to the MNRF firefighters who safely protected the site and saved our infrastructure.



Provincial Environmental Assessment (EA) Terms of Reference Update

First Mining Gold received approval of the Springpole Gold Project EA Terms of Reference on November 8 which triggers the formal EA process. We would like to acknowledge all those who provided feedback. Your input helped shape the ToR.

The ToR is the framework for the preparation and review of the Environmental Assessment. It describes:

- The purpose of the proposed project

- Alternative methods for the project and how they will be assessed
- How Indigenous communities, government agencies, public, and stakeholders will be engaged and consulted.

The next step of the EA process requires the submission of a draft EIS/EA in 2022 after consultation with communities.

THE SPRINGPOLE GOLD PROJECT Timeline at a Glance

2015 – FMG completes acquisition of Gold Canyon Resources Inc., which wholly-owns the Springpole Gold Project.

2017 – FMG announces a positive Preliminary Economic Assessment.

2018 – FMG submitted the Project Description to the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency (now called the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada). Based on the Project Description, a Federal Environmental Assessment was required, and the government issued Federal Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) Guidelines for the Project.

2019 – FMG announces the positive results of an updated Preliminary Economic Assessment.

MARCH 2021 – FMG announces positive pre-feasibility study for the Springpole Gold Project.

APRIL 2021 – FMG submitted the Project's Terms of Reference (ToR) to the Provincial Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks. The ToR is the framework for the preparation and review of the provincial Environmental Assessment.

NOVEMBER 2021 – ToR approved, Environmental Assessment formally underway.

FAQ: WHY IS THE SPRINGPOLE PROJECT A PROPOSED OPEN PIT MINE?

A question First Mining Gold is frequently asked, why is the Springpole Project proposed as an open pit mine; why is an underground mine not an option?

There are a few reasons why an open pit mine is the preferred alternative for the Springpole Project, and why an underground mine is not a viable option.

The four primary reasons are:

- 1. Safety:** The ore is very friable or crumbly, so it would not support underground access. Tunnel construction would not be feasible in this rock type.
- 2. Economics:** The grade of gold in the ore would need to be much higher (at least 5 gpt (*grams per tonne*)). The Springpole ore is around 1 gpt which is too low to mine economically from underground.
- 3. Type of ore:** The Springpole ore body is one large mass of mineralization as opposed to bands of thin veins in *solid* rock at a depth that can be mined with more selective underground methods. The ore is also near the surface, so underground mining methods would not be suitable for this type of ore body.
- 4. Water management:** The amount of water inflow in an underground working scenario would be challenging to manage with the ore body near surface.

There are several mines in Canada that are similar in nature that have successfully and safely gone into production while achieving a high level of environmental protection. Two examples of this are the Meadowbank Mine and the Gahcho Kué Mine in the Arctic.

Environmental Baseline Study Update

In addition to the environmental baseline study overview described in our last newsletter, there has been a great deal of environmental baseline work carried out during this past year at the Springpole site to support the EA process.



This work includes:

- Hydrology – stream flow/lake level monitoring
- Surface and Ground Water Quality monitoring
- Terrestrial Bat Swarming/Hibernacula (shelters that are used by bats through the winter)
- New Air Quality Monitoring station put up at site (two Air quality stations now)
- Aquatics Surface Water Profiles and Plankton/Fish community

- Our Springpole Gold Project is one of a kind in Canada, with the potential to produce more than 300,000 ounces of gold or more per year. That's more than nine tonnes!
- The expected life of the mine is a minimum of 12 years, providing sustainable employment and long-term community benefits. Approximately 350 job positions will be required at the on-site camp.
